## CAMPUS OPENING - OCTOBER 18TH

A full 12 months of waiting and wondering will be climaxed at 2:30 p.m. on Saturday, October 18, when Education Minister, Mrs. Eileen Dailly cuts the traditional ribbon to mark the official opening of the first phase of the new Malaspina College campus.

Located on a spectacular hillside site with entrances off both Fourth and Fifth Streets the \$10.25 million campus is certain to attract widespread public attention in the years to come. Planned to compliment its dramatic setting, one that provides a superb view, the new campus will consist of nine buildings in all with eight of these already completed or under construction.


The two buildings now ready for occupation are the Learning Resources Centre and the Cafeteria Administration block with the latter earmarked to provide the stage for the opening ceremony. In addition to Mrs. Dailly, the platform guests will include local MLAs Dave Stupich and Bob Skelly, along with College President, Dr. Carl Opgaard and College Council Chairman, Don Hammond.

Also in attendance will be members of the faculty and staff from the Kennedy Street and Wakesiah Avenue campuses, members of both Student Councils, College Council and the Citizens' Committee. Invitations have also been sent to community leaders and civic representatives throughout the College Region as well as to senior educators in the Department of Education and in the school, college and university systems.

Don Hammond, acting as host for the day in his capacity as College Council Chairman, is anxious to make the whole affair as informal as possible and promises that the speechmaking will be kept fairly brief.


For entertainment he has secured the services of the 60 strong Malaspina College Choir, conducted by Eugene Weigel, with Jeff Reynolds, another member of the music faculty, on hand to make his mark with what could well prove to be a roof raising series of trumpet solos.

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## FILM FESTIVAL

### SHAME

The Malaspina Film Festival continues its series of films on war with Ingmar Bergman's *SHAME* (1969), to be shown on Friday, Oct. 17, at 8:00 p.m., for \$1.00 (50c for students), in room 108.

Bergman is an explorer of hells -- psychological, sexual, social. In *SHAME* he breaks new ground: political hell is the setting for his drama of total collapse.

Set in the near future, *SHAME* portrays a world of nameless, interconnected wars that no one tries any longer to understand. The viewer, in fact, can't make sense of the film's few battle scenes, any more than the characters can, any more than a Vietnamese villager knew whose bombs, and why, were dropping. In this field of random violence, a couple (once musicians, now just survivors) gradually forfeit their humanity as the price of sheer existence.

If *SCENES FROM A MARRIAGE* is Bergman's warmest film, *SHAME* is his coldest, least hopeful. Years of random bombing in Asia is the basis of this film's vision of the future. In a previous film, *PERSONA*, Bergman showed a mental patient frozen in a corner of her room, staring at a television as it babbled Viet-Nam war news. The T.V. typified all that she was escaping by going mad. In *SHAME* she has walked into the screen, into that reality. The result is an uncompromising war film.

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## THE GREENPEACE CONSPIRACY

Bob Hunter, journalist and now full time President of the Greenpeace Foundation, will be here Thursday, October 16 to give a public lecture on Project Ahab.

Bob Hunter likes to refer to himself as "a reformed astronaut" ... "an explorer" ... "a media theorist" ... and "a western rationalist." In fact, he is all of these as well as being a novelist, journalist and eco-activist.

A Libra, Bob Hunter was born in St. Boniface, Manitoba, on October 13, 1941. He attended elementary and secondary school in Winnipeg and, despite receiving a T. Eaton Arts Bursary to the University of Manitoba, dropped out of school in Grade 11. Forsaking a career in art, he bounced around through a series of jobs, including encyclopedia salesman, dishwasher, partsman, foundryman and slaughterhouse worker. In 1968 he became a columnist with *THE SUN*.

While doing his column, Hunter also produced two books on cultural change and the transformation of human consciousness, *THE ENEMIES OF ANARCHY* and *THE STORMING OF THE MIND*. Hunter has always been active in the Greenpeace environmental movement and in 1972 he sailed with the first Greenpeace protest vessel against the planned U.S. underground nuclear test at

Amchitka in the Aleutian Islands. From the experience and from his involvement in assisting the Greenpeace III and IV sailings protesting the French nuclear tests at Mururoa Atoll in the south Pacific, Hunter produced the book, *GREENPEACE*.



Greenpeace protest vessels gained world-wide attention when they confronted the French Navy at the South Pacific atomic blasts and the U.S. Navy at Amchitka. Most recently Hunter and Greenpeace engaged the Russian whaling fleet in the open Pacific in a desperate effort to stop the extinction and slaughter of whales. Hunter discusses through films and slides the plight of whales, Project Ahab and the Russian fleet and Greenpeace. An intensely exciting and moving program.

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first time. Then it was little more than a bare hillside with the occasional random group of trees to provide shelter for the resident deer and pheasants.

All the indications are that there will be

a big turnout for the occasion and Mr. Muir warns intending guests that they should not expect to find the campus as a whole in its completed state.

"We will have the first two buildings ready," he explains, "but you must remember that we still have a long way to go before the job is completed. There are six other buildings in various stages of construction at the moment and we have not even started on the site work for the gymnasium."

Following the speeches, guests can look forward to light refreshments with catering in the hands of the students in the College's Cook Training Program, supervised by Leo Teygeman. In fact, this is to be a day of days for the trainee cooks as they will also be responsible for the catering to Premier Dave Barrett's NDP Banquet, which is to be held in the Learning Resources Centre that evening.

# RUGBY



The start of a new academic year at Malaspina also means the start of another rugby season and today finds the College squad looking ahead to what promises to be a make or break year.

Encouraged by a run-away 43-12 Totem Conference triumph over BCIT, in Vancouver, and subsequently chastened by a 27-7 exhibition defeat at the hands of Brentwood College, at Brentwood, Malaspina returns to action with back to back home engagements against Okanagan College on October 18 and 19.

From all accounts this is a potent Okanagan combination for it opened the season with impressive away victories over BCIT (22-0) and Capilano (17-0). Results like these make for confidence and anything less than a maximum effort could put paid to Malaspina's title ambitions for another year.

Ground advantage can mean a great deal in rugby and there is no reason why this Malaspina side should not come up trumps over the two day period. What is needed now is a really superlative effort on the part of the forwards.

Possession is vital to the cause and given a fair share of good ball the College has the talent behind the scrum to make mincemeat of any opposition. Against the eager beaver Brentwood XV the forwards, handicapped by the absence of John De Boeck, Ian Ross and Paul Blake, allowed themselves to be outplayed by younger and better organized opponents.

As a result the backs were left to play a defensive role throughout finishing thoroughly frustrated. It was a different story at BCIT where the likes of Dale Milford, Brian Woods and five try exponent Bruce McKenzie were given ample opportunity to display their talents in attack.

A year ago Malaspina took an under strength side to Okanagan and dropped four precious points, 7-4 and 7-0. The results speak for themselves and nothing will be left to chance this time. In fact there is even talk of a Friday night curfew just to ensure that one and all come to Caledonia Park in peak condition.

After these two matches Malaspina travels to Trinity Western on October 25 and Capilano on November 1 before finishing the series off with a run of three more home engagements, BCIT (November 15), Capilano (November 23) and Trinity (November 29).

named Billy Pilgrim who "gets unstuck in time" and lives in random time snatches, now a kid soldier in Dresden, now a middle-aged optometrist. But it remains true to the basically irresolvable forces of the novel, and even retains the magic planet of Trafalmore, where all paradoxes should resolve but don't. If you haven't read Vonnegut you don't know what I'm talking about. Suffice to say that this film is one of those rare events, a completely engrossing experience. The highly polished technology of Hollywood film-making has never been marshalled to more stunning and complex effect. I mean, even Kurt Vonnegut got excited about this film.

(Warning: the film has no scenes of violence, an almost total absence of coarse language, and only marginal nudity.)


